

Foreign Policy Priorities for the Next President



Fall 2004 Study Group Series: September 28 – November 16, 2004

This series, based on a similar highly successful one conducted in 2000, seeks to highlight the leadership responsibilities that will fall to the newly elected president of the world superpower, particularly following the 9/11 events and their consequences. These include mobilizing multilateral support to resolve the war in Iraq and Afghanistan, Mid-East instability, growing terrorism and the North Korean nuclear threat. At the same time, the newly elected president and Congress must deal with an increasingly globalized economy under the World Trade Organization, rebuild relations with an enlarged Atlantic Alliance, strengthen Asian security arrangements and aid developing nations in matters relating to health and poverty. Overshadowing all this is the need for leadership in confronting the threat of global warming. Our speakers for this series will offer their views on these issues and suggest potential solutions to major problems.
